



HOW TO ASK FOR TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

Step 1: Do Your Research

The first thing to look into is whether or not your company already has a tuition reimbursement policy. If it does, study it thoroughly. Ask your HR department to help you with applying for support. If your company doesn't have an existing tuition reimbursement program, you'll need to be able to show your boss, with facts, exactly why the MBA program you've selected is the best possible option for your career, and how the courses you'll take will improve your performance for the company.



Pro tip

Do the research to bolster your claims and justify your request.

Step 2: Begin to Build Your Case

Brainstorm three to five reasons why this is the right MBA program for your career and fully flesh those out until you have a nearly airtight, short presentation. Don't forget to include the cost and length of the program, but be sure to explain that these are outweighed by the benefits your company will reap. Explain how the course learnings will actively enhance your work performance and how the program will boost your current role.



Pro tip

Be sure to stress that you have a plan for how funding your MBA will provide long-term benefits to your organization by enabling you to create a real and sustainable impact.



Step 3: Ask to Meet With Your Manager

Schedule a one-on-one meeting with your boss, and make sure to prepare in advance so you'll be ready for any tricky questions, with solid answers ready. Show that you're deeply invested in furthering your career with an MBA and refer to your research and talking points to demonstrate this. Offer to keep your manager updated on what you're learning in class, as well as sharing new skills and relevant knowledge with the rest of your team.



Pro tip

Demonstrate to your boss that you're invested in bettering yourself and the company with your MBA.

Step 4: Be Respectful in Victory or Defeat

If you react poorly to being denied tuition reimbursement, the powers that be will almost certainly remember that you were not gracious about their initial rejection. If you do get a "no", thank your boss for taking the time to hear you out and consider the matter, and then ask to be updated if anything changes in the future. You may help your case by letting them know that you're still planning to find alternative ways to fund your MBA education, but that you're also still willing to share your learning outcomes with the rest of your team.



Pro tip

No matter which decision you receive, be respectful. Even if you're told "no" right now, budgetary restrictions or company policy may change in the future.
